


St. Louis County Population Regions



### Population Age Structure St. Louis County 2000











# Appendix

## Census Report Mapping and Facts



## Definitions

---

**Average Household Size:** A measure obtained by dividing the number of people in households by the total number of households (or householders).

**Family Household:** A family includes a householder and one or more people living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. All people in a household who are related to the householder are regarded as members of his or her family.

**Homeowner Vacancy Rate:** The homeowner vacancy rate is the proportion of the homeowners housing inventory that is vacant for sale.

**Household:** A household includes all of the people who occupy a housing unit. People not living in households are classified as living in group quarters.

**Housing Unit:** A housing unit may be a house, an apartment, a mobile home, a group of rooms, or a single room that is occupied (or vacant, is intended for occupancy) as a separate living quarters.

**Income of Families:** In compiling statistics on family income, the incomes of all members 15 years old and over in each family are summed and treated as a single amount.

**Income of Households:** Includes the income of the householder and all other individuals 15 years old and over in the household, whether they are related to the householder or not. Because many households consist of only one person, average household income is usually less than average family income.

**Labor Force:** The labor force includes all people classified in the civilian labor force (that is, “employed” and “unemployed” people) plus members of the U.S. Armed Forces.

**Married-Couple Family:** A family in which the householder and his or her spouse are enumerated as members of the same household.

**Median:** Represents the middle value. The median divides the distribution into two equal parts: one-half of the cases falling below the median income and one-half above the median.

**Median Income:** The median divides the income distribution into two equal parts: one-half of the cases falling below the median income and one-half above the median.

**Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA):** Metropolitan statistical areas (MSA’s) are relatively free standing large population centers with a high degree of economic and social integration.

**Mortgage Status:** Mortgage refers to all forms of debt where the property is pledged as security for repayment of the debt, including deeds of trust, trust deed, contracts to purchase, land contracts, junior mortgages, and home equity loans.

**Non-Family Household:** A household consisting of a householder living alone or with non-relatives only.

**Occupied Housing Unit:** A housing unit is classified as occupied if it is the usual place of residence of the person or group of people living in it at the time of enumeration, or if the occupants are only temporarily absent; that is, away on vacation or business.

**Owner-Occupied Housing Unit:** A housing unit is owner-occupied if the owner or co-owner lives in the unit even if it is mortgaged or not fully paid for.

**Rental Vacancy Rate:** The proportion of the rental inventory that is vacant for rent.

**Renter-Occupied Housing Unit:** All occupied housing units that are not owner-occupied, whether they are rented for cash rent or occupied without payment of cash rent, are classified as renter-occupied.

**Seasonal, Recreational, or Occasional Use Housing Unit:** Seasonal, recreational, or occasional use housing units include vacant units used or intended for use only in certain seasons, for weekends, or other occasional use throughout the year. Interval ownership units, sometimes called shared ownership or time-sharing condominiums, are included in this category.

**Units in Structure:** The number of housing units in a structure of specified type and size.
