# **CARES ACT**

**Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) St. Louis County Funding Overview** 

**Background**: The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act was passed by Congress and signed into law by the President on March 27, 2020. CARES includes \$2 trillion in economic relief intended to protect the American people from the public health and economic impacts of COVID-19.

On April 2, 2020, St. Louis County received notification of funding allocations from the CARES Act for use to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The allocations are flowing through two existing programs administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The St. Louis County area of CARES funding eligibility is all of St. Louis County outside the Duluth city limits. Duluth also received notice of CARES Act allocations to be used within the city limits.

The following information provides residents, businesses, and agencies guidance on the potential use of the COVID-19 funding by St. Louis County.

#### **Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG-CV)**

**Purpose**: Funding must be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus pandemic (COVID-19) among individuals and families who are homeless or receiving homeless assistance; and to support additional homeless assistance and homelessness prevention activities to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19.

#### **Amount:** \$578,797

**Eligible Uses**: HUD is preparing additional guidance on eligible uses. The following are examples, not usage limitations:

- Emergency Shelter existing ESG spending limits on emergency shelter are waived
  - Temporary shelters are eligible through leasing of existing property or temporary structures
  - o Local health officials must determine site necessity and habitability
- Homelessness prevention assisted clients must meet HUD's at risk of homelessness definition
- Rapid Re-housing provision of short and medium term rental assistance
- Street Outreach case management with medical referral, supplies distribution (masks, hand sanitizer, tissues, soap), and supplies for staff
- Training on infectious disease prevention and mitigation
- Hazard pay for staff working directly to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus among persons who are homeless or at risk of homelessness

#### **Community Development Block Grant (CDBG-CV)**

**Purpose**: Funding must be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus (COVID-19). CDBG funds target helping low- and moderate-income people, the prevention or elimination of slums or blight, or activities to address an urgent threat to health or safety.

#### **Amount:** \$1,164,632

**Eligible Uses**: HUD is preparing additional guidance on eligible uses. The following are examples, not usage limitations:

- Acquire, construct, rehab, or install public works or facilities
  - Construct facilities for testing, diagnosis or treatment
  - Rehab a facility as a treatment clinic
  - Acquire and rehab or construct a group living facility for treatment
  - o Rehab a commercial building or closed school as a treatment clinic
  - o Acquire and rehab a motel or hotel building to expand hospital capacity
  - Interim improvements to private properties to allow temporary quarantine of an individual patient (owner-occupied rehab)
- Business assistance
  - Grants or loans to support business creation or expansion of medical manufacturing companies
  - Short-term assistance to businesses to aid worker retention must be low- and moderate-income persons
  - Microenterprise technical assistance, grants, or loans to establish or stabilize businesses providing medical, food delivery, cleaning, or other services supporting home health and quarantine
- Public Services must provide new or quantifiably increased service
  - Job training to health care workers
  - Testing, diagnosis, and other services at a fixed or mobile location
  - o Increase capacity and availability of response within existing health facilities
  - Equipment, supplies and materials to carry out a public service
  - Deliver meals to quarantined people or those social distancing because of medical vulnerability
- Planning
  - Gather data and develop specific emergency infectious disease response plans

#### Process

St. Louis County must conduct a public participation process to award the funding and submit an amendment to its Fiscal Year 2020 Action Plan for HUD approval. HUD has provided a waiver to some provisions of the public participation process to allow faster submission of the amendment and implementation of proposed activities. The Planning and Community Development Department gathered public input to the coronavirus impacts through a public survey, strategic agency and group consultations, and County interdepartmental outreach. The public survey was made available from April 29 – May 22, 2020, and generated 386 responses. Compilation of this information was used to create a list of activities eligible for funding and solicitation of applications through existing public notification processes and will be used as a framework on funding priorities for the Citizen Advisory Committees as they review project applications and make recommendations on the award of the special COVID-19 funds to the County Board.

The data was compiled and priorities were created for housing, economic development, community facilities, public infrastructure, and public service categories. The following is a brief overview of the top priority for each category:

- Housing Utility payments/Fuel assistance
- Economic Development Small business financial assistance
- Community Facilities Emergency services
- Public Infrastructure Broadband internet
- **Public Service** Personal protective equipment

**HUD COVID-19 Funding Eligibility**: While the county is interested in all community development needs, HUD COVID-19 funding is restricted on the types of projects may be funded. Project eligibility for CDBG-CV and ESG-CV is the same as typical CDBG and ESG funding with an additional requirement that projects must also provide assistance in preventing, preparing for, and responding to COVID-19.

**Projects and Advisory Boards**: Project applications were solicited through legal notice, press releases, and email releases. Applications received were reviewed by the St. Louis County Citizen Advisory Committee for the CDBG program and the Rural Housing Coalition for the ESG program. The CDBG and ESG Advisory Committees were convened on July 9 and July 13, 2020 respectively to review all applications and form funding recommendations. The recommendations will then be made available for public comment over an abbreviated five-day public review period. After the public review, the funding recommendations will be presented to the County Board for consideration

**Citizen Participation Plan:** The St. Louis County Citizen Participation Plan for use of HUD entitlement funding is also being amended to comply with requirements of the CARES Act funding. The revised plan follows for public review and comment.

**County Board**: The Advisory Committee recommendations and any public comments about the funding recommendations or amended Citizen Participation Plan will be presented to the St. Louis County Board of Commissioners for its review and action at a public hearing on July 28, 2020.

### Citizen Participation Plan St. Louis County And Northeast Minnesota HOME Consortium

#### Purpose

The Consolidated Plan provides a unified vision for community development actions through its collaborative processes. Creation and submission of a Consolidated Plan is a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requirement which combines the planning and application processes for three Community Planning and Development (CPD) programs: Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG).

The St. Louis County Consolidated Plan covers the geographic area of the four non-urban counties of Cook, Lake, Koochiching and Itasca, and the urban county of St. Louis, excluding the City of Duluth. The Plan includes the following information:

- 1. An examination of the current housing market conditions
- 2. Identifies housing, homeless, and community development needs of the County and the Northeast Minnesota HOME Consortium,
- 3. Establishes priorities for expending HUD program funds; and
- 4. Analyzes impediments to fair housing choice.

The County's citizen participation plan serves as the foundation for developing stronger citizen relationships in the County and Consortium. St. Louis County supports and encourages the participation of citizens, community groups, and interested agencies in the development and evaluation of programs and activities covered in the Consolidated Plan. Increasing citizen and community involvement is important to gain understanding of area needs and develop strategies to address those needs.

#### Outreach

The citizen participation process is designed to encourage all citizens to participate in determining housing and community development needs within their communities. St. Louis County works with community-based organizations serving HUD-targeted populations to organize events such as focus group meetings, forums, and community meetings. Notices of meetings are provided through newspaper publication, email groups, direct mailings, and County web site posting. Meetings are conducted in facilities that are accessible to persons with disabilities. The services of a translator or interpreter are provided upon request.

#### Citizen Participation Advisory Committee Structure

Advisory committees for each CPD program are established to prioritize housing, community development, and homeless activities. Committee members are notified of meetings in advance and meetings are open to the general public.

#### **Community Development Block Grant**

The St. Louis County Board of Commissioners appoints County residents to a nineteen member CDBG Advisory Committee. Their primary responsibility is to make recommendation to the County Board on the distribution of CDBG project funds. Using the priorities and needs outlined in the Consolidated Plan and an annual budget, the Advisory Committee reviews submitted applications to formulate its recommendations to the County Board for inclusion in the annual Action Plan.

The County Board publishes vacancies on the CDBG Advisory Committee once a year in local newspapers and provides notification to citizens, cities, townships, and non-profit groups through email groups. Information is also posted on the County's website (www.stlouiscountymn.gov).

Members are appointed to serve a three-year term and may be reappointed to serve a second term. Terms are staggered to ensure committee service by experienced members. A chairperson is selected by committee members. Meeting dates are set as needed with a quorum at six members. Composition of the Advisory Committee was established by the County Board as follows:

- Seven at-large members
- Seven representatives one from each of the following communities (Chisholm, Ely, Eveleth, Hermantown, Hibbing, Rice Lake Township, and Virginia)
- One representative of St. Louis County Township Officers Association
- One representative of Northern St. Louis County Township
- One representative of Southern St. Louis County Township
- One Executive Director of Range Association of Municipalities and Schools (RAMS)
- One representative of small towns with populations of less than 3,500

#### **HOME Investment Partnerships Program**

The HOME program covers the five county consortium of Lake, Cook, Koochiching, Itasca and St. Louis, excluding the City of Duluth. The Northeast Minnesota HOME Consortium Advisory Committee is composed of ten members, one county commissioner and one housing advocate appointed by each respective County Board. St. Louis County administers the program and provides staffing to the committee. The Consortium Advisory Committee meets semi-annually to gain a better understanding of the housing needs in the consortium, develop strategies to address those needs, and to propose a recommendation on the use of HOME funding to the St. Louis County Board for its inclusion in the annual Action Plan.

#### **Emergency Solutions Grant Program**

The St. Louis County Rural Housing Coalition (RHC) serves as the advisory committee for the ESG program because of its connection to the St. Louis County Continuum of Care (CoC). The RHC is composed of citizens, housing and homeless service provider staff persons, and St. Louis County staff persons from Public Health and Humans Services and Community Development. The RHC meets monthly to discuss issues related to homelessness and to develop appropriate strategies to address those needs. Members of the RHC are also appointed to the CoC Advisory Committee to assure coordination with the CoC and the St. Louis County Plan to End Homelessness. The RHC reviews applications for ESG funding and makes a recommendation on the proposed use of ESG funds to the St. Louis County Board for inclusion in the annual Action Plan. The RHC recommendation is also provided to and endorsed by the CoC Advisory Committee.

#### Technical Assistance

Technical assistance is provided to local units of government and local non-profit agencies desiring to develop applications for programs covered by the County's Consolidated Plan. An annual open house and workshop describing the CDBG program application process is conducted in two locations each year to make local units of government, non-profit agencies, and citizens aware of the CDBG funding opportunity. The Planning and Community Development Department also conducts contract training annually with subrecipients to review CDBG program requirements.

#### Public Comment on the Proposed Consolidated Plan

The County makes available the proposed Consolidated Plan to interested parties during a public comment period. This comment period begins no less than thirty days before the plan's April 15 annual submission date to HUD or as modified by HUD notification. Citizens are notified of the Plan's availability through the newspaper, direct mailings, email groups, and County web site posting. The notification is published before the comment period begins. The contents and purpose of the plan and the location where copies of the proposed Consolidated Plan may be reviewed are included in the notice.

#### **Public Hearings**

Public hearings and public meetings are held to receive citizen comments about housing and community development needs. The public hearings are held in buildings accessible to persons with disabilities, and appropriate accommodations are made to meet the needs of non-English speaking attendees where a significant number of non-English speaking residents are reasonably expected to participate. Non-English speaking residents or their representative may contact the community development division for assistance. The county purchases interpreter or translator services when requested.

A minimum of two public hearings for each annual program cycle are held at different times during the program year. One public hearing is held prior to the County Board submission of the Consolidated Plan, and one public hearing is held during the implementation stage. The purpose of the public hearings is to:

- Receive comments from citizens, public agencies, community members and other interested parties
- Respond to proposals and comments at all stages of the consolidated submission process
- Identify housing and community development needs
- Review proposed use of funds
- Review program amendments
- Review program performance

The public hearings are held at times and locations convenient to potential and actual beneficiaries of each CPD program. In addition to public hearings, a minimum of one public informational meeting is held during the process. Meetings are held at different times and locations and are published through the media, email distribution, and direct mailing. To give adequate notice of public hearings, St. Louis County has notices detailing the purpose of the hearings published in a regional newspaper at least ten days in advance. Information about county public hearings can also be accessed by calling 218-749-9741.

#### Citizen Participation Requirements for Local Governments

Local government units applying for CDBG funds are encouraged to comply with citizen participation regulations outlined at 24 CFR 570.486. Prior to submitting their application for CDBG funds, the local government applicant must provide sufficient opportunity for affected citizens to gain an understanding of the proposed project activities and the amount of CDBG funds being sought. A minimum of one public meeting is required, but communities are encouraged to engage citizens at the onset of the project's planning process. Applicants must give adequate notice of public meetings and must provide citizens with a timely written response to any complaints or grievances. Documentation of the public meeting is submitted with their application for CDBG funding.

#### **Consideration of Public Comments**

St. Louis County considers the comments of individuals or groups received in writing or verbally at the public hearings and meetings. A summary of the written comments and responses is included in the final Consolidated Plan. Summaries of public comments are also attached to plan amendments, performance reports and annual Action Plans.

#### **Complaints**

All written complaints pertaining to the Consolidated Plan are responded to within fifteen working days of receiving the complaint.

#### Amendments to the Consolidated Plan and Action Plan

The following criteria constitute an amendment to the Plan:

- A change in the allocation of priorities or method of distribution that is not discussed in the Consolidated Plan.
- Funding an activity using funds from any program covered in the Consolidated Plan (including program income), not previously described in the Action Plan.
- A change in the purpose, scope, location or beneficiaries of an activity.

Only **substantial** changes to the Plan require a public hearing. A substantial change is defined as any authorized activity where the use of CPD funds changes from one eligible activity to another.

The proposed amendment is published and available for public comment over a thirty day comment period. Citizens are notified of the proposed amendment through a regional newspaper.

If a change in the location of the service area or change in beneficiaries is proposed, the public hearing must be held in the jurisdiction most affected by the change. Subrecipients that are local units of government or public agencies must hold a public hearing. The public hearing must be of a form and content established by the County. If the subrecipient is a non-profit agency, the County convenes the public hearing. The County notifies HUD of final amendments upon completion of the amendment process. The official designee for transmitting amendments to HUD is the St. Louis County Planning and Community Development Director.

If a "regular" amendment is made to the Plan, the proposed amendment is made public and the County notifies HUD that an amendment has been made.

#### **Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report**

The Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) provides HUD and the public opportunity to review annual program year accomplishments under the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs. It is prepared and submitted to HUD within ninety days after the end of each program year. Prior to its submission, the CAPER is made available for fifteen days of public comment. Citizens are notified of the CAPER's availability through newspaper publication, email groups, direct mailings, and County web site posting.

#### **COVID-19 Citizen Participation and Public Process**

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act was passed by Congress and signed into law by the President on March 27, 2020. CARES includes \$2 trillion in economic relief intended to protect the American people from the public health and economic impacts of COVID-19.

St. Louis County received notification of funding allocations from the CARES Act for use to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The allocations are flowing through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG-CV) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG-CV) programs administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Along with the funding awards, Congress and HUD have allowed expedited procedures to prepare for, propose, modify, or amend grantee statements of activities as listed in the CARES Act.

St. Louis County will use the following public participation process for CARES Act funding and any amendments to its annual Action Plans:

- Citizen, community, and agency input to funding needs and priorities will be gathered in the following ways:
  - Use of an on-line survey
  - o Strategic meetings with communities, agencies, and groups impacted by COVID-19
  - o Interdepartmental consultation within St. Louis County
- Applications for each funding source will be announced using news releases, email groups, and County web site posting.
- Advisory Committees for each funding source will review applications and provide funding recommendations to the St. Louis County Board.
- Citizens will be provided with notice and a reasonable opportunity to comment of no less than five days on the intended use of CARES Act funding.
  - The County may create virtual public hearings to fulfill public hearing requirements.
  - The five-day public comment period may run concurrently for Action Plan amendments and amendments to the Citizen Participation Plan.
- The County may apply for waiver of other provisions of the CDBG and ESG programs as provided by HUD and in compliance with existing or subsequent HUD notices and memorandums.

#### St. Louis County Policy

The St. Louis County Board of Commissioners adopted the following Resolution No. 148 on February 19, 2002, to ensure access to services for people with limited English language skills.

"It is the policy of St. Louis County to ensure equal access to St. Louis County services for all eligible persons. St. Louis County will not deny access to county services to any eligible person because they do no speak English or speak limited English. Accordingly, St. Louis County will take reasonable steps to ensure that persons with limited English proficiency receive the language assistance necessary to allow them meaningful access to county services, free of charge, in a way that preserves confidentiality, and in a timely manner.

A person has limited English language proficiency when they are not able to speak, read, write, or understand the English language at a level which allows effective interaction with St. Louis County staff.

County departments shall adopt procedures outlining how the department will provide language assistance to persons who have difficulty communicating in English. Such language assistance services may include interpretation services, and, when required by law, the translation of vital documents. For purposes of this policy, interpretation is a spoken or visual explanation provided to help people who do not speak the same language communicate with each other. Translation is a written document provided in a different language than the original document.

St. Louis County will disseminate, provide training, and will monitor the effectiveness of this policy and applicable procedures.

Any complaint regarding the implementation of this policy or procedures adopted pursuant hereto shall be directed to the county's affirmative action officer."

#### Questions and Access to Information

Access to program information and a schedule of meeting times and publication dates is provided to the public. Program records and information, consistent with state and local laws regarding privacy and obligations of confidentiality, are available for citizen review at the office of the St. Louis County Planning and Community Development Department. During public comment periods, published documents are available at the Planning and Community Development Department offices in Virginia and Duluth and through the county's web site <u>www.stlouiscountymn.gov</u>. All documents are available to the public at no charge. Information is made available in accessible formats upon request.

The County is a registered participant of the Language Line interpreter service offered through the Minnesota Department of Administration. The Planning and Community Development Department has designated the main office number as its designated line for this service, with the identifier code CDBG. The interpreter service is offered for face-to-face meetings or when receiving or placing calls with non-English speakers.

The Minnesota Relay Service is used to contact a deaf, hard-of-hearing, or speech impaired person. This service is contracted under the Minnesota Department of Public Service. The State Services for the Blind is contacted when Braille services are required for a vision impaired person.
