OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF ST. LOUIS, MINNESOTA, HELD ON OCTOBER 11, 2022

The Board of County Commissioners of the County of St. Louis, Minnesota, met this 11th day of October 2022, at 9:34 a.m., at the Ely City Hall, Ely, Minnesota, with the following members present: Commissioners Frank Jewell, Patrick Boyle, Ashley Grimm, Keith Musolf, Keith Nelson, Mike Jugovich and Chair Paul McDonald -7. Absent: None - 0.

Chair McDonald asked for a moment of silence in remembrance of all victims of violence, foreign and domestic; followed by the pledge of allegiance.

Ely City Councilor Angela Campbell welcomed the Board to the City of Ely.

Chair McDonald opened the meeting to persons who wish to address the Board concerning issues not on the agenda. Bud Van Deusen, of Eagles Nest Township, said the Eagles Nest Trails Advocacy Group opposes the All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV) corridor trail going through Eagles Nest Township. Mr. Van Deusen said that over 450 people have signed a petition in opposition of the trail and no governmental agency has demanded that the trail go through the community; the developer made that decision. Mr. Van Deusen provided the Board with an informational packet and requested an opportunity to meet with the Board to discuss concerns regarding the trail. Rich Floyd, Chair of the Eagles Nest Town Board, said that a number of people in the township oppose the trail location and that it is not fair to add noise to the area. Mike Banovetz, of Ely, provided the Board with several letters relating to interaction with Eagles Nest Township regarding the ATV trail. Mr. Banovetz commented that that Commissioners should look at the larger scale development of the Taconite Trail. Dayna Mas, of Ely, said she is concerned about the safety of ATV use on Trygg Road. Claudia McBride, of Ely, asked why an environmental impact study has not been done and asked how the trail would affect hunters. Clayton Cich, of the Fredenberg Township Board, commented that there should be equal treatment for all gravel pit operators and commented that Fredenberg Township wants all parcels reviewed when gravel pit inspections are conducted. Bruce Anderson, of Duluth, said he opposes all gravel pits in neighborhoods and Conditional Use Permits (CUP) for gravel pits should not be rubber stamped. Melissa Bell, of Duluth, said the CUP issued to 6464 Fredenberg Lake Road should be voided and commented about the letter read by Commissioner Nelson at the September 13, 2022 Board meeting. A point of personal privilege was taken at 10:06 a.m. At 10:13 a.m., the Board reconvened with all members present. Chair McDonald asked that all speakers be respectful, not single out county employees or Commissioners, and to address the Board as a whole. Ms. Bell continued her comments and asked for an investigation of the Planning Department because information has been withheld by the department. Bryana Salo, of Aurora, discussed concerns she had relating to the death of her brother. Ms. Salo said she has reached out to the county; however, she has not received any response. Ms. Salo discussed privacy concerns she had regarding conversations with a Commissioner about potentially sharing the incident report relating to the death of her brother.

At 10:24 a.m., a public hearing was conducted, pursuant to Resolution No. 22-470, adopted August 9, 2022, to receive public comment on the proposed expansion of the "Joint Powers Agreement for the Collection and Administration of a Local Lodging Tax in the Ely Area" to include unorganized territories 61-12, 61-14, 63-14, 63-15, 64-14, 65-14, 66-12, 66-13, 66-14, 67-13, 67-14 and 68-14.

St. Louis County Deputy Administrator Brian Fritsinger commented that the current agreement includes five unorganized territories; the resolution would bring the number to thirteen unorganized territories. The changes are recommended due to changes in short-term rentals. Terry Soderberg, Chair of the Morse Town Board and Ely Lodging Board, said he was in favor of the expansion. Cindy Smyka, Executive Director of the Ely Tourism Bureau, commented that the district spans two counties and collects \$300,000 annually. Director Smyka commented that the proposal will help prevent short-term rentals from slipping through the cracks; there are probably 15 to 25 Vacation Rentals by Owners (VRBO) in the proposed area. Ron Rykken, owner of Timber Bay Lodge, said he is supportive of the expansion. McDonald asked if there were any opponents or citizens who wished to speak regarding the proposed action; no one requested the opportunity to speak. At 10:42 a.m., Commissioner Jewell, supported by Commissioner Jugovich, moved to close the public hearing. The motion passed; seven yeas, zero nays.

Commissioner McDonald, supported by Commissioner Boyle, moved that the St. Louis County Board determines that the proposed tax is in the public interest and authorizes the imposition of a local lodging tax of three percent (3%) in the following unorganized townships: 61-12, 61-14, 63-14, 63-15, 64-14, 65-14, 66-12, 66-13, 66-14, 67-13, 67-14 and 68-14; further, that as to each affected unorganized territory, if no valid petition is timely filed in accordance with the statute, or if such petition is timely filed, this resolution is approved by the voters in a reverse referendum in accordance with the statute, then the appropriate County official(s) are authorized to enter into any necessary and proper amendment(s) to the Agreement pursuant to the statute. Commissioner Nelson said he was concerned that inclusion of unorganized territory 63-15 overlapped with the Vermilion Lake Resort and Tourism Association District. Director Smyka said the Ely Tourism Bureau contacted the Vermilion Lake Resort and Tourism Association and they were unable to get a clear boundary of their district; they would be fine to exclude unorganized territory 63-15 from the proposal. Commissioner Nelson asked County Attorney Kim Maki if the Board could include a contingency clause or remove unorganized territory 63-15 from the resolution. Attorney Maki recommended that the Board reopen the public hearing and continue the hearing to a future date. At 10:58 a.m., Commissioner Jewell, supported by Commissioner Nelson, moved to reopen the public hearing, and to continue the public hearing to the November 15, 2022 Board meeting. The motion passed; seven yeas, zero nays.

Commissioner Nelson, supported by Commissioner Jewell, moved to approve the consent agenda. The motion passed; seven yeas, zero nays.

Commissioner Jugovich, supported by Commissioner Nelson, moved that the St. Louis County Board supports the efforts of the Department of Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation, the City of Chisholm, and Essentia Health to build a new clinic and public health and social services facility in the City of Chisholm to replace the outdated clinic in that city, and authorizes a lease with Iron Range Real Estate, LLC for the leasing of space in a new public health and social services facility to be constructed at the intersection of Iron World Road and Highway 169 in the City of Chisholm, Minnesota; and further, that St. Louis County will commit, through its social services or other public health providers, to lease at a minimum 1,500 feet of space in this facility, with a lease term of ten (10) years commencing upon the completion of the construction of the project, with a rental rate of \$25 per square foot plus CAM (Common Area Maintenance) charges of \$7 per square foot for a monthly rate of approximately \$4,000 or \$48,000 annually. The Board will provide additional financing to cover the costs associated with the build out of the tenant space, not to exceed \$225,000; and further, that the County Attorney is authorized to negotiate and enter such lease on behalf of the

County with funding for annual rent to be identified by the County Auditor. St. Louis County Deputy Administrator Brian Fritsinger said the county has not identified a clear need for the space. The challenge for partners is that the lease rate of \$32 per square foot is significantly higher than they are able to pay. Deputy Administrator Fritsinger noted that the county sent a request for information to approximately one hundred agencies and only two responded. The two agencies that responded are aware of the concept to reduce rates. Commissioner Jugovich commented that there may be a group that is interested and Essentia Health will opt out if an agreement is not reached by the end of the year. Commissioner Jugovich stressed the importance of daycare in the area and said he has heard conflicting information regarding construction of the daycare. Commissioner Jugovich said he would like the groups to meet again to see if an agreement can be reached. After further discussion, Commissioner Nelson, supported by Commissioner Jewell, moved to table discussion to the November 29, 2022 Board meeting. The motion passed; seven yeas, zero nays.

Commissioner Nelson, supported by Commissioner Jugovich, moved that the St. Louis County Board authorizes the appropriate county officials to execute a contract with G Men Environmental Services, Inc., for the demolition of the structures on parcels 090-0010-03820 and 090-0010-03830 (203 and 205 Chestnut Street in Virginia, MN) at the bid price of \$197,997.00 and in accordance with the specifications of Bid No. 5854 and addendums, payable from the Economic Development Blight Project Fund 178, Agency 178005, and subject to approval of the County Attorney. The motion passed; seven yeas, zero nays. Resolution No. 22-559.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Board authorizes the appropriate county officials to execute contracts with National Insurance Services for short-term disability insurance, long-term disability insurance and life insurance coverages for plan years covering January 1, 2023, through December 31, 2027.

WHEREAS, Growing Futures of Ely, MN, was the original low bidder and awarded the project in the amount of \$11,500 (Resolution No. 22-457), and can no longer fulfill the terms of the contract; and

WHEREAS, The project shall now be awarded to TNT Timber of Duluth, MN, in the amount of \$27,485.

WHEREAS, On June 7, 2022, the St. Louis County Board authorized the application of the 2022 Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Site-based Program (COSSAP) Grant from the U.S. Department of Justice by Resolution No. 22-326; and

WHEREAS, The COSSAP Grant is designed to respond to illicit substance use and misuse to reduce overdose deaths, promote public safety, and support access to treatment and recovery services in the criminal justice system; and

WHEREAS, This grant includes the hiring an additional 1.0 FTE Administrative Corrections Sergeant to be eliminated upon completion of the three-year term of the COSSAP Grant if no other funding source is identified; and

WHEREAS, Contracting with Recovery Alliance Duluth for a Peer Recovery Specialist and the Center for Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center to provide a Behavioral Specialist at the St. Louis County Jail and Northeast Regional Correction Center (NERCC) will promote ongoing recovery for individuals experiencing a substance use disorder.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the St. Louis County Board authorizes the acceptance of the 2022 COSSAP Grant in the amount of \$1,299,760 over a three-year grant period (October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2025) to support an administrative sergeant, probation officer, behavioral services, peer recovery specialist support, Narcan kits, and evaluation services, to be accounted for in Fund 100, Agency 137999, Grant 13703, Year 2022.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the St. Louis County Board authorizes the addition of a 1.0 FTE Administrative Corrections Sergeant which will be eliminated upon termination of the grant.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the St. Louis County Board authorizes contracts with Recovery Alliance Duluth for a Peer Recovery Specialist and the Center for Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center to provide a Behavioral Specialist.

WHEREAS, In 1963 St. Louis County accepted an agreement with property owners to petition for sanitary sewer and disclaimer, referred to as the 1963 Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Property owners under this agreement were allowed to maintain individual septic treatment systems (ISTS). At a later date, however, property owners were expected to petition for the construction of a sanitary sewer at a location designed to confer a special benefit upon their property and pay any assessments arising as a result of construction of such sanitary sewer; and

WHEREAS, The 1963 Agreement encumbers the following real property in Duluth Township:

The Northeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter except the easterly thirty-three feet, and the Northwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter except the westerly thirty-three feet, all in Section 4, Township 51 North, Range 12 West of the Fourth Principal Meridian, St. Louis County, Minnesota (the Property).

Today, this land consists of the following four homesteads and tax parcels: 1753 Old North Shore Rd, Duluth (315-0010-00731); 1767 Old North Shore Rd, Duluth (315-0010-00730); 1775 Old North Shore Rd, Duluth (315-0010-00734); 1754 Old North Shore Rd, Duluth (315-0010-00732); and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to St. Louis County Subsurface Sewage Treatment System (SSTS) Ordinance No. 61, the County sought input from the Duluth/North Shore Sanitary District (DNSSD) to determine whether it would support release and termination of the 1963 Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Upon review of the location and distance of the property from current DNSSD services and infrastructure, along with the consideration of substantial costs of extension, the DNSSD represents no plans to extend sanitary sewer to the property for the foreseeable future; and

WHEREAS, The DNSSD, by resolution dated April 20, 2022, does not object to a release and termination of the 1963 Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Should sanitary sewer be extended to serve the property in the future, St. Louis County SSTS regulations would normally require connection to the public sewer regardless of whether the 1963 Agreement remains in place.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the St. Louis County Board authorizes the Planning and Community Development Director and a representative of the County Attorney's Office to negotiate and execute the appropriate instruments needed to effect termination and release of the 1963 Agreement.

WHEREAS, The Purchasing Division solicited bids for the demolition of tax-forfeited structures; and

WHEREAS, G Men Environmental Services, Inc., of Ely, MN, submitted the low bid in the amount of \$197,997.00.-

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the St. Louis County Board authorizes the appropriate county officials to execute a contract with G Men Environmental Services, Inc., the demolition of the structures on parcels 090-0010-03820 and 090-0010-03830 (203 and 205 Chestnut Street in Virginia, MN) at the bid price of \$197,997.00, in accordance with the specifications of Bid No. 5854 and addendums, payable from the Economic Development Blight Project Fund 178, Agency 178005 and subject to approval of the County Attorney.
