RELATED DEPARTMENT GOAL:

To provide mandated and discretionary licensing services in a timely manner.

ACTION REQUESTED:

The St. Louis County Board is requested to consider an Off-Sale Intoxicating Liquor License for Bell Resorts, Inc. dba Voyagaire Lodge & Houseboats, Crane Lake Township.

BACKGROUND:

Bell Resorts, Inc., has made application for an Off-Sale Intoxicating Liquor License for the establishment known as Voyagaire Lodge & Houseboats, Crane Lake Township. Minn. Stat. § 340A.405, Subdivision 2(d), relating to the issuance of off-sale intoxicating liquor licenses provides that "No license may be issued under this subdivision unless a public hearing is held on the issuance of the license. Notice must be given to all interested parties and to any city located within three miles of the premises to be licensed. At the hearing the county board shall consider testimony and exhibits presented by interested parties and may base its decision to issue or deny a license upon the nature of the business to be conducted and its impact upon any municipality, and the character and reputation of the applicant, and the propriety of the location."

The County Liquor Licensing Committee considered and approved the application and recommends Board approval. According to the St. Louis County Fee Schedule, this establishment is applying for an Off-Sale Intoxicating Liquor License located in Area 3 and the annual license fee is \$150.00.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the St. Louis County Board consider the testimony at the public hearing and barring any valid objection, approve the issuance of the off-sale license.

Public Hearing to Consider Off-Sale Intoxicating Liquor License (Crane Lake Township)

WHEREAS, Bell Resorts, Inc., dba Voyagaire Lodge & Houseboats, Crane Lake Township, St. Louis County, Minnesota, has applied for an Off-Sale Intoxicating liquor license; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 340A.405, Subdivision 2(d), requires that a public hearing be held prior to the issuance of an Off-Sale Intoxicating liquor license; and

WHEREAS, A public hearing was held on February 9, 2021, at 9:40 a.m., in the St. Louis County Public Works, Virginia, Minnesota, for the purpose of considering the granting of the Off-Sale Intoxicating Liquor License; and

WHEREAS, With regard to the application for said license, Bell Resorts, Inc., has complied in all respects with the requirements of Minnesota Law and St. Louis County Ordinance No. 28; and

WHEREAS, The Liquor Licensing Committee of the St. Louis County Board of Commissioners has considered the nature of the business to be conducted and the propriety of the location and has recommended approval of the application.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That an Off-Sale Intoxicating Liquor License shall be issued to Bell Resorts, Inc. dba Voyagaire Lodge & Houseboats, Crane Lake Township, located in Area 3, and in accordance with the St. Louis County Fee Schedule the annual fee is \$150.00.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That said liquor license shall be effective through June 30, 2021.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That said license is approved contingent upon payment of real estate taxes when due.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That if the named license holder sells the licensed place of business, the County Board may, at its discretion and after an investigation, transfer the license to a new owner, but without pro-rated refund of license fee to the license holder.

RELATED DEPARTMENT GOAL:

To secure and administer federal, state and other funding which implement county policies and maximize local resources.

ACTION REQUESTED:

The St. Louis County Board is requested to award 2021 Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Prevention Aid and authorize the Planning and Community Development Director and a representative of the County Attorney to negotiate contracts and authorize the appropriate county officials to execute contracts for all approved projects.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

In the 2014 legislative session, the Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Aid program was established. The funds under this program are allocated to counties based 50 percent on each county's share of watercraft trailer launches and 50 percent on county's share of watercraft trailer parking spaces. The state appropriation for 2021 is \$10 million. St. Louis County's allocation for 2021 is \$709,530. One half of the allocation is paid to the county in July 2021 and the second half is paid in December 2021. There is also an additional \$20,000 available in reprogrammed funds, which are un-utilized 2019 grant funds.

The program funds are to be used to prevent the introduction or limit the spread of aquatic invasive species at access sites throughout the county. In May 2015, Resolution No. 15-284, the County Board approved the Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Plan and authorized the Planning and Community Development Director to solicit proposals for the use of Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Aid. To date, St. Louis County has funded 53 projects totaling \$3,774,396.

On September 24, 2020, notification was provided to all cities, towns and over 400 parties informing them that the county was soliciting proposals for the use of the 2021 Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Aid. The application, instructions and other information were posted on the St. Louis County AIS webpage and distributed using a GovDelivery newsletter. Proposals were due by November 20, 2020.

The County has received 9 applications totaling \$853,445 for a variety of proposals. Based on the technical review and other considerations, county staff has made specific funding recommendations in the amount of \$654,530 for eight projects.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the St. Louis County Board allocate the 2021 Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Aid as outlined in County Board File No. ______; authorize the Planning and Community Development Director and a representative of the County Attorney to negotiate and execute contracts; and authorize the appropriate county officials to execute contracts for all approved projects. Funds for these projects are available from Fund 100, Agency 10999, Grant 10910, for Year 2021.

RELATED DEPARTMENT GOAL:

To resolve litigation against St. Louis County.

ACTION REQUESTED:

The St. Louis County Board is requested to approve a proposed settlement in *King v. County of St. Louis*, Case No. 69DU-CV-17-527, an action brought by Paul King, Copasetic, Inc., Eric Ringsred, and Temple Corp, Inc. against St. Louis County and the Duluth Economic Development Authority.

BACKGROUND:

The parties have agreed to a proposed settlement of the action that is subject to the approval of the St. Louis County Board. Under the proposed settlement, the plaintiffs will release their claims against St. Louis County and its officers, employees, and agents, and St. Louis County will make settlement payments in the amount of up to \$190,000.00. A portion of this amount will be used to pay the outstanding taxes, assessments, penalties, interest, and costs assessed against the parcel of real property known as the St. Regis Apartments (PIN 010-0950-00870), and the remainder will be used to reimburse the plaintiffs for certain costs incurred in maintaining and repairing the St. Regis Apartments.

The settlement terms are reasonable given the facts and circumstances of the action, and the proposed settlement will allow St. Louis County to avoid the expense and risk associated with further litigation. The settlement agreement will contain a provision stating that St. Louis County denies the plaintiffs' allegations as set forth in its answer and other papers filed with the Court, denies any wrongdoing, and denies that the plaintiffs are entitled to any relief, and stating that St. Louis County is entering into the settlement agreement solely to avoid the burden and expense associated with further litigation.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the St. Louis County Board approve the proposed settlement and authorize the appropriate county officials to negotiate and execute appropriate settlement documents and to make the settlement payments contemplated by the proposed settlement in the amount of up to \$190,000.00.

WHEREAS, The plaintiffs in the action are Paul King, Copasetic, Inc., Eric Ringsred, and Temple Corp Inc., and the defendants are St. Louis County and the Duluth Economic Development Authority; and

WHEREAS, The plaintiffs and the defendants have reached agreement on a proposed settlement of the action that is subject to the approval of the St. Louis County Board; and

WHEREAS, Under the proposed settlement, the plaintiffs will release their claims against St. Louis County and its officers, employees, and agents, and St. Louis County will make settlement payments in the amount of up to \$190,000.00; and

WHEREAS, a portion of this amount will be used to pay the outstanding taxes, assessments, penalties, interest, and costs assessed against the parcel of real property known as the St. Regis Apartments (PIN 010-0950-00870), and the remainder will be used to reimburse the plaintiffs for certain costs incurred in maintaining and repairing the St. Regis Apartments; and

WHEREAS, The St. Louis County Board wishes to approve the proposed settlement to avoid the expense and risk associated with further litigation.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the St. Louis County Board approves the proposed settlement and authorizes the appropriate county officials to negotiate and execute appropriate settlement documents and to make the settlement payments contemplated by the proposed settlement in the amount of up to \$190,000.00, with \$11,929.00 payable from Fund 178, Agency 178006, and the rest payable from Fund 720, Agency 720001, Expense Code 636200.
